

A message from the Board

Paul Somerville, Chairperson

On behalf of the Board of Amicus, I would like to inform everyone that our CEO, Ann-Maree Davis has resigned from Amicus.

Ann-Maree was CEO for almost 14 years and led a significant reorientation of the services that Amicus provides in order to transition from a facility-based day service model to a flexible community-based model of support. She has actively led capacity building for people with a disability, and vulnerable young people, families, and the sector in the areas of individualisation of funding, self-directed approaches and alternatives to traditional models of support.

Ann-Maree played a significant role in growing the organisation on many different levels. Revenue increased from approximately \$700,000 per annum in 2008 to the current level of over \$15m. The Amicus organisation has also grown to a team of over 400 participants and 220 staff members, while also expanding its geographic footprint across Central and Northern Victoria.

We would like to acknowledge the significant contribution that Ann-Maree has made to the lives of people with a disability across Central Victoria and thank her for all her hard work whilst at Amicus.

The Board has commenced a recruitment process to engage a replacement, however this is expected to take several months. In the meantime, we have appointed Ken Marchingo AM as Interim CEO until we can secure the services of a new CEO. Ken is an experienced CEO with more than 27 years CEO and not-for-profit sector experience.

A change of CEO is always a significant event and it is understood that this may come as a shock to some participants, staff and community members. Please be assured that the Board and Management Team are working closely together to ensure this change is as smooth as possible.

The Board is optimistic about the future, and the role of Amicus in providing excellent support services to those that choose to be supported by us. We thank you for your continued support, work and the strong relationships we share with Amicus participants and carers, staff and community partners.

Participant updates

VAL'S JOURNEY HOME

One of Melissa Court's long-term residents, Valerie (Val) Monaghan has had some wonderful surprises recently.

She has received word that she will soon be able to move back to her home in Bendigo and as an even bigger surprise, Val's family has organised a new puppy for her. Val is thrilled and eager to return home to Kangaroo Flat to spend time with the beloved sister, Beverley and also the new love of her life – gorgeous Rusty, a rust-coloured havoodle puppy.

"To say Valerie is excited is an understatement," support worker Samantha (Sam) Gilbertson said.

Rusty is a welcome distraction after Bev lost her beloved caboodle in 2021. Val has several framed photos of Biscuit next to her bed and she still misses him. Val has been living full-time at Melissa Court respite house in McKenzie Hill for 11 months following a stroke in December 2020 that brought a halt to her busy, active life. She spent periods of time at the Royal Melbourne Hospital, Bendigo Hospital and at Bendigo Health's Golden Oaks nursing home over seven months and then moved to supported accommodation due to her loss of speech and mobility challenges.

Over the past six months Val has increased visits to her home in Kangaroo Flat and is looking forward to returning there to live fully with her sister Bev. Val and Bev have always been close and shared the house together for years when Val was working as a nurse with Austin Hospital. However, it has not been a fast process and Val's loss of speech and the limited use of her right hand has impaired her progress. While she was in hospital, Val's main goal was to return to living independently back at home and in the community and she is on the way there. Val is due to move back to Bendigo early next month (June 2022) as soon as upgrades and the installation of an accessible bathroom are completed.

Her expressions and eyes reflect how much she is looking forward to returning home. She is particularly looking forward to having Rusty with her all the time, 'being able to sleep in' and having her own things around her. Some of those special items are the memorabilia from past travels with Bev and the cookbooks that both used to try new dishes. Val is not a 'foodie', but she does like pancakes with banana for breakfast and looks forward to roast lamb with mint jelly for Sunday dinner. She enjoys being outside in Melissa Court's beautiful surrounds and while indoors, she enjoys 'scary' films and TV shows.

Her dedicated support people – Sam Gilbertson, Rhonda Joyce, Thee Ree and Babalou – have developed several communication methods they can use these to support Val so she can be as independent as possible and make choices about her daily activities. As Val is nonverbal, her team are diligent in sharing information with other team members to ensure her choices are followed through across shifts.

Through the NDIS Val accesses medical support services, including Interchange, district nursing, podiatrist and physiotherapist visits. Val will require support with daily living and personal care when she moves back home to Kangaroo Flat, but she is determined to keep progressing. She aims to keep working on her mobility and communication issues which are the greatest barriers to reaching her goal of independent living. She is also grateful for the support and company of nieces, Robyn and Deb and their families, Carol and Graeme and nephew Michael, as well as the support of the Bendigo Stroke Survivor group.











CHILD'S SPECIAL DAY OUT WITH THE DINOSAURS

One of Amicus' Children's Services participants recently had an exciting day out. Accompanied by his support worker, the young person travelled to Melbourne on Saturday 14 May to visit the Melbourne Museum.

It wasn't the first time they had been to Melbourne for a day outing but it was the first for some time, so everything was fresh and exciting. Even more exciting was the chance to visit and experience the special dinosaur exhibition. The participant, who turns 10 in October this year, has been with Amicus for almost three years with Robbie as his dedicated support person. Robbie, who organised the Melbourne excursion said he really enjoys his time with this young person.

"We've got a good partnership," he said, "I have a soft spot for him... I've watched him grow over the years. Usually we spend a few hours together on a Saturday, but I thought we'd do something different and have a day out."

"We were originally planning to go to the zoo but then it looked like it would be raining, so we switched to the Museum," Robbie said. It turned out to be a good decision as the museum was hosting a special dinosaur exhibition. The participant had a great time taking lots of photos on his iPad and looking at all the different dinosaurs. The triceratops display was his favourite.

Triceratops – The Fate of the Dinosaurs is an immersive experience where participants can explore the Cretaceous period, join in fun activities, ask the experts their dinosaur questions and get to know the creatures that lived in that era.

While at the Museum, the young person was also able to see the First Peoples display again and learn more about his Aboriginal heritage. While his carers had previously taken him to the museum and had provided the opportunity to attend, it was great for him to again experience this valuable cultural experience.

Another part of the fun was taking the train down and back and the child was full of smiles.

They caught the train from Bendigo to Southern Cross Station and then made their way by tram to the Melbourne Museum. "He loves taking the train. He was very excited looking out the windows," Robbie said.

They took their own lunches and lots of snacks, but as an extra treat enjoyed some Hungry Jacks' takeaway while waiting for the train home. "We left at 9.30am and got back to Bendigo at 6pm, so it was a full-on day," they both agreed.



The Melbourne trip was a great time and the participant will always be able to remember the day by looking at all of the photos on his iPad.








BERVIN MEETS A PARALYMPIC CHAMPION

WEBDON DRIVE UNITS COMPLETED


We are excited to announce that our Specialist Disability Accommodation (SDA) units at Webdon Drive are now completed.



Seasonal health information

INFLUENZA (FLU) VACCINATIONS

Vaccination against the flu remains important this year. The flu is a highly contagious viral infestation that can cause illness. Behaviours such as increased hand washing, mask wearing when appropriate and social distancing can help to stop the spread of germs.

Flu vaccinations are recommended for anyone six months and over. Between 1 June and 30 June, all Victorians aged six months and over are eligible for the free flu vaccinations from their GP or pharmacist. This will help boost vaccination coverage and avoid more hospitalisations throughout winter.

Those always eligible for free influenza vaccines include:

- Children aged six months to five years
- All Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders aged six months and over
- People aged six months and over with certain medical conditions that increase chances of severe influenza and its complications
- Pregnant women (at any stage of pregnancy)
- People aged 65 years and over

Influenza (Flu) vs COVID-19 vaccines

Whilst Australia is delivering COVID-19 vaccines and boosters nationally, it's important to keep up the good hygiene practices to not only help prevent COVID-19, but also the flu.

The Australian Government Department of Health currently provides this advice about receiving both the COVID-19 vaccine and Influenza vaccines:

- COVID-19 vaccines and the flu vaccine have been approved to be administered on the same day, you no longer need to wait 14 days between vaccines.
- There is no particular requirement regarding the order of receiving a dose of influenza vaccine and either the first or second dose of a COVID-19 vaccine.

Masks are still required on public transport and in rideshare services, and in airports and on aircrafts.



BOOSTER DOSE FOR ELIGIBLE 12-15 YEAR OLD CHILDREN

The Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) recommends that a first booster dose of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine may be given to the following children aged 12-15 years who have completed a primary course of vaccination three or more months ago:

- those who are severely immunocompromised
- those who have a disability with significant or complex health needs
- those who have complex and/or multiple health conditions that increase the risk of severe COVID-19

Currently, Moderna and Novavax are not licensed for use as a first booster dose in this age group. ATAGI continues to recommend a three-month interval between a recent confirmed COVID infection and a scheduled dose of COVID-19 vaccine.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU TEST POSITIVE FOR COVID-19

If you test positive to COVID-19 there are things you need to do to protect yourself and the community.

Report your result and immediately isolate for seven days

If you test positive on a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) you must report your result to the Department of Health online or call 1800 675 398. You don't need to report your result if you tested positive from a PCR test.

You must isolate for seven days from the date that you took your positive RAT or PCR test. For example, if you took the test on a Monday, you would leave isolation anytime the following Monday. You do not need to get tested again to be released from isolation after seven days.

While you are in isolation:

- You can not leave your house for any reason except to get tested, get medical care or medial supplies, or in an emergency
- It is important that you contact Amicus to cancel all your non-essential supports.
